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Bathroom Renovations

According to estimates from HomeAdvisor, the national average cost for a complete bathroom renovation in 2019 is \$10,349. It's a popular room to remodel as it gives many homeowners the chance to add value to their home while making it more livable.

Before jumping into a DIY renovation job, consider the extent of your needs. Since bathrooms feature plenty of water connections, being unfamiliar with routing and sealing joints can create disastrous results. Leaks can cause more than expensive flooring repairs; it also introduces a breeding ground for health hazards like mold.

INSPECT FLOORING

Before any bathroom renovation project, you should ensure the integrity of the floor, especially for areas around toilets, showers and sinks. If you notice signs of water damage are already present, it's important to resolve them before going forward with the project.

If you will be replacing the flooring, it's easy to find damage by ripping up the old material. However, if you plan to leave the floor in place, make sure it is free from sagging or signs of mold. These issues may not present themselves until some appliances are moved, so make sure to leave room in your budget for unexpected expenses.

Another issue that is common when water damage goes unresolved are problems to joists below the subfloor. This expensive remediation is necessary as it is a sound part of your home's structural integrity.

REPLACING APPLIANCES

When new bathroom appliances are in the cards, consider upgrading to energy and water efficient options. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, if every household in the country used these efficient fixtures and appliances, more than three trillion gallons of water would be saved annually. You will also notice a decrease in your electricity expenses as the energy needed to power them is greatly reduced.

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Create New Attic Living Space

BUILDING A SUBFLOOR

Your home's attic was likely built to add storage for items like boxes, suitcases or trunks. Unfortunately, many contractor's or home builders don't foresee the need for an attic to become a living space, so before you can upgrade it, a subfloor must be installed over the bare joists.

To add a floor, it's not always as simple as laying plywood down on the current supports. Many times, homes are built with bare joists that are unsuitable for the additional weight of furniture, people or pets who will frequent the new space.

However, to create a safe area, an expert can cut boards of the same length and nail them to the existing joints to create a durable structure.

HEATING AND AIR

When planning an attic renovation, it's important to include plans on heating and cooling the new room. If you want it to be included in your current system's ductwork, hiring a professional HVAC technician is the best way to ensure it is rerouted properly and efficiently.

If you want to forgo the expense of redirecting air into your attic, you can get by with the assistance of a window unit in the summer and by using space heaters during cooler temperatures.

If you're a fan of home improvement reality shows or follow renovation trends, you know that an open floor plan is a popular design that many homeowners want.


In fact, the National Association of Home Builders reports that 70% of recent buyers were interested in at least an open kitchen plan while 32% preferred a completely open arrangement.

Insulation plays a large role in maintaining temperatures during both winter and summer and takes some of the brunt off our heating and air systems.


The American Society of Home Inspectors encourages us to pay attention to this element as its purpose is to slow the rate of heat transfer.

The United States Department of Energy reports most fiberglass products contain 40 to 60 percent of recycled glass. WHERE TO INSULATE

One of the most common areas Americans choose to use insulation is the attic. Not only is it cost effective, it's a simple way to add extra protection to your home. In unfinished areas, it is recommended to place the barrier between floor joists to seal the living space below.

Here are some other popular places to add insulation as recommended by the United



States DOE:

• All exterior walls between unheated spaces like a garage, shed or storage areas;

• Floors above cold spaces like crawl spaces and basements; and

• Foundation walls above ground level.

true fiberglass insulation, the DOE also recommends these advanced options. Consider the advantages these innovative materials will provide for your family.

Choosing foam board or rigid foam to insulate unfinished walls and unvented-slope roofs provides a high-insulation value.

In hot climates, a reflective

insulation system is optimal. It features a radiant barrier which works to reflect heat absorbed by a roof. To be effective, it must face an air space to keep the hot temperatures in your attic rather than in your living space.

An all-in-one insulation that can benefit any area in your home and be efficiently installed to an established structure is spray foam. Hire a licensed expert to install the barrier as specialized tools are sometimes required.
