Honoring Fathers Around the World

Father's Day in the United States developed several years after Mother's Day, when in 1909 Sonora Smart Dodd, who was one of six children raised by a widower, began rallying for an equivalent holiday to celebrate fathers. One year later the state of Washington recognized the nation's first Father's Day.

It was not until 1972, 58 years after President Woodrow Wilson announced Mother's Day, that President Richard Nixon made Father's Day a national holiday.

Here is a glimpse of how five other countries celebrate dads.

RUSSIA

In Russia, Father's Day is a holiday that emerged from a military celebration honoring all men. Defender of the Fatherland Day honors the Red Army's establishment during the Russian Civil War. The day now also includes the celebration of Russia's fathers.

GERMANY

On the 40th day of Easter, known as Ascension Day, Father's Day is celebrated in the form of hikes and other outdoor activities — with lots of food and beer of course. The day is referred to as Gentlemen's Day.

NEPAL

In Nepal, celebrating fathers is a ritual that is taken very seriously. Occurring in the early fall, the day is known as Gokarna Aunsi, which includes a ceremony where children must look directly in their father's eyes and give gifts of appreciation. Deceased fathers are also honored through other celebrations,

including visiting temples.

ROMANIA

This holiday is relatively new for Romanians. It was the last

nation in the European Union to have its own special day for dads, designating a day in 2010 after the Alliance Fighting Discrimination Against Fathers

lobbied hard for the day.

THAILAND

In Thailand, Father's Day is celebrated on the king's birth-

day. Children to give dads and other male family members the canna flower — a symbol of masculinity — and wear yellow to honor the king.



Father's Day Fast Facts

We love dads. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, there are more than 70 million fathers across the United States, and we celebrate them on the third Sunday of every June.

MODERN DAY CELEBRATIONS:


- Gift-giving is a common way we show dads how much we appreciate them. The most common gifts are those associated with home improvement, outdoor tools and electronics.

- Mother's Day holds the record for most the phone calls made on a given day. Father's Day has more collect calls placed than any other holiday.

A BRIEF HISTORY

- Washington was the first state to officially declare Father's Day a holiday in 1910.

- Popular gifts such as ties, socks, golf clubs and shaving kits got their start during the



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Great Depression, when struggling retailers tried new marketing techniques to sell men's wares.

- In World War II, the holiday cemented in people's hearts when Father's Day

became a way to honor soldiers and the war effort more generally.

- In 1972, President Richard Nixon officially declared Father's Day a national holiday.

BY THE NUMBERS

- A recent study shows that fathers who share household chores with their wives have more ambitious daughters and daughters who hold broader definitions of gender

roles.

- The amount of time dads in the U.S. spend with their children has tripled since 1965, and the number of stay-at-home dads has nearly doubled since 1989.

There are more than 84 million acres of scenery for us to enjoy. With 417 sites, including 129 historical sites, 87 national monuments, 59 national parks, 19 preserves, 18 recreational areas, 10 seashores, four parkways, four lakeshores and two reserves, there is bound to be something of interest near you.

One such fictional person is Coach Eric Taylor of “Friday Night Lights.” This father of two also is helping raise more than 20 football players as head coach of the Dillon, Texas Panthers.

Taylor is a tough, honorable man who inspires those around him to be the best versions of themselves — but he’s always there to help guide them when they slip. The words of wisdom we’ve gained from Coach Taylor are many. These are our favorite 10:

“Listen to me. I said you need to strive to better than everyone else. I didn’t say you needed to be better than everyone else. But you gotta try. That’s what character is. It’s in the trying.”
