

Dad's Sweeping Impact

Father's Day gives us an annual opportunity to thanks dads for all they do.

Their contributions are big and small, but often critically important to the health, happiness and well being of their children. Here's a look at dad's sweeping impact.

CHANGING ROLES

Modern fathers are far more involved with their children's every-day lives, and that's actually a relatively recent phenomenon. Into the 1960s, dads were rarely present during labor and took little part in caring for their children beyond a tossing the odd ball around. Today, we understand that kids begin bonding with their fathers at much earlier ages — and that fathers become more involved with their children as they grow older when they take on early caregiving. The rise of stay-athome dads and, more recently, remote work environments have continued to reshape the way we think about dads and child rearing. Thankfully, it's not all viewed now as "women's work."

THE FATHER EFFECT

Children who grow up with a father who's present and engaged are more likely to stay in school, and less likely to end up incarcerated, when compared with those who had absent fathers or other male role models. Kids with



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involved dads actually have higher IQ scores by age 3, and suffer fewer psychological and emotional problems throughout their lives. Fatherless children tend more toward risk taking, and are more likely to have sex at younger ages. Once they're grown, they are more likely to have stable, healthy relationships — and more likely to have higher-paying jobs. Together, these collective benefits have been described as the "Father Effect."

EMERGING STUDIES

Many of these statistics have only recently been revealed,

since the study of fatherhood and its impacts is still an emerging field. Academic journals now regularly publish new information about how the presence of a dad helps bolster children's lives, but it wasn't always so. We're now learning, for instance, that father figures help reduce

aggressive tendencies in children, and delinquency among daughters. Busy dads or those who are divorced should remember that any time spent with kids will bolster their lives in these very important ways. So focus on quality over quantity. Even a call or text can make a child's day.

Father's Day Gift Ideas

whether dad is working at home or back in the office. It boasts a warm, natural likelike glow and can double as a Zoom light when he's otherwise backlit.

ALWAYS-PREPARED DAD

Hilife's handheld garment steamer will ensure that your dad is always looking his best, even on the go. It's small enough to fit in a suitcase, but heats up so fast that he'll never be late for another hastily called Zoom meeting. Meanwhile, the Kaito KA500 radio can be an essential emergency-preparedness tool in the event of a black out. The Holiday's Beginnings

Father's Day started out as a modest event on June 19, 1910, but didn't become a recognized U.S. holiday until 1972 — almost 60 years after Mother's Day was made official by President Woodrow Wilson.

Mother's Day grew out of reconciliation campaigns for moms who sons fought on both sides of the Civil War. The informal celebration quickly took off when retailers — in particular, florists - recognized the profit potential. Dads, however, weren't often the recipient of bouquets of flowers, so decades passed without similar recognition.

A West Virginia church sponsored a day honoring fathers in 1908, following an explosion at the local coal mine — but that was only a one-day commemoration. Sonora Smart Dodd, a child of a widower from Spokane, Washington, became the first widely known proponent of an official equivalent holiday for dads. The initial statewide Father's Day followed.

President Calvin Coolidge urged other states to observe the day in 1924, even as some pushed to combine Mother's and Father's Day into one single holiday called Parents' Day.

Coolidge memorably said the day should be set aside "to establish more intimate relations between fathers and their children and to impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligations."

The trials and tribulations of the Great Depression followed, and some struggling retailers took up the cause of making

Father's Day official once more. The movement received another boost during World War II, when the day was thought of as another way to honor our troops. By then, the day was an established tradition, but still not officially recognized.

President Lyndon Johnson signed an executive order in

1966 codifying the holiday on the third Sunday in June. President Richard Nixon then declared the day a national holiday in 1972, while in the midst of a re-election campaign. Sonora died six years later, at age 96.

A number of other countries have joined the U.S. in recognizing the role of fathers on the

third Sunday in June - including the U.K., France, Greece, Cuba, Mexico, Switzerland and Singapore, among many others. The holiday is celebrated on days across the calendar elsewhere. It's in March in Italy and August in Brazil. Australia celebrates in September, while Finland honors dads in November.

FUN (AND FUNNY) GIFTS

There are a growing number of special gift-giving ideas for

Celebrating Dad Worldwide

Many countries also honor dads, but with their own special traditions.

The U.S. developed Father's Day traditions long before it was officially recognized as a holiday. By then other countries had also found unique ways — and in some cases, their own unique days — to recognize dad's unique contributions.

AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND

Father's Day is marked on the first Sunday in September as spring begins in Australia and New Zealand. They reportedly chose September specifically because Father's Day observances elsewhere happened during periods where lots of other holidays were already on the calendar.

BRAZIL

Brazilians celebrate dad on the second Sunday in August, a day of honor shared with St. Joachim — the father of Mary in the Christian historical tradition.

CANADA AND THE U.K.

Mother's Day actually falls on the different date in the United Kingdom than it does in America, but the two countries share the same holiday for dads — the third Sunday in June. So does Canada.



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GERMANY

Germans call it Gentleman's Day. The holiday arrives on the sixth Thursday after Easter.

Otherwise known as Ascension Day on the Christian calendar, it's exactly 40 days after Easter Sunday. They celebrate with outdoor activities like hiking, and then consume lots of celebratory food and beer.

ROMANIA

Believe it or not, Romanians didn't designate a special day for dads until 2010, becoming the last European Union nation to do so. The Alliance Fighting Discrimination Against Fathers was instrumental in making the holiday official.

SPAIN, PORTUGAL AND ITALY

These Roman Catholic

countries celebrate Father's Day on March 19 — known as the Feast of St. Joseph, a religious holiday honoring Jesus' father.

SWEDEN, NORWAY AND ICELAND

Most countries in Scandinavia mark the holiday on the second Sunday in November, after lobbying from the business community to move it from the traditional June date to a time when the economy has slowed.

THAILAND

Father's Day is marked in Thailand on the king's birthday. Children give their fathers and other male family members a canna flower, which is considered a symbol of masculinity. They also wear yellow, in honor of the king.
