

Father's Day in the U.S.

Dads have two women to thank for their king-for-a-day status today.

Fathers have been honored around the world since the Middle Ages, but Father's Day in the U.S. wasn't celebrated until the early 1900s.

GRACE GOLDEN CLAYTON

Grace Golden Clayton is credited with suggesting the first one-time celebration of fathers. It is the first recorded celebration of Father's Day in the United States. In 1907, a coal mining disaster occurred in West Virginia that killed 361 men, 250 of them fathers. Clayton suggested to her pastor that a memorial honoring fathers be held the next year, choosing July 5, because it was the Sunday closest to her father's birthday.

The event was local and did not gain national attention.

SONORA SMART DODD

Born in 1882 in Arkansas, Dodd was one of six children born to Civil War veteran William Jackson Smart and his wife, Ellen Victoria Cheek Smart. When she was 7, the family moved to Spokane, Washington. When she was 6, her mother died in childbirth. As the only girl, she helped her father raise her younger brothers.

Dodd was attending a Central Methodist Episcopal Church service and heard a sermon about Mother's Day, a



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celebration that had just been enacted. Given the great respect she had for her father, she felt that there should also be a Father's Day. She proposed the idea to the Spokane Ministerial Alliance, asking that it be held on June 5, her father's birthday. They instead chose the third Sunday in June and celebrated it for the first time on June 19, 1910, at the YMCA in Spokane.

ESTABLISHING FATHER'S DAY

It took awhile for the holiday to become established, though President Woodrow Wilson sent a telegraph to Spokane in 1916 praising their Father's Day services. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge supported the idea of a national Father's Day, but wasn't able to make it happen.

Dodd began efforts in the

1930s to make it a national holiday, working with trade groups that would benefit from the holiday — including those that made traditional men's gifts such as ties and tobacco pipes. In 1938, the New York Associated Men's Wear Retailers founded the Father's Day Council to promote the holiday.

It wasn't until 1966 that President Lyndon B. Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day. Then in 1972, President Richard Nixon made it an official and permanent national observance.

Father's Day is now celebrated on the third Sunday of June in many countries around the world. It is a day to honor and appreciate fathers and father figures for their love, support and dedication to their families.

Evolution of Fatherhood

Over the past several generations, the roles of fathers have undergone significant changes. They've evolved from being expected to be the person who supports the family financially to being equal partners in child-rearing and household responsibilities. HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

Traditionally, fathers were seen as the head of the household and the primary breadwinners. Fathers were expected to work outside the home and provide for their families financially, while mothers were responsible for childcare and domestic duties. The role of fathers was to provide for their families and be distant authority figures who enforced discipline.

CHANGES IN THE ROLE OF FATHERS

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and this shift has accelerated in recent years. Fathers are now seen as equal partners in childrearing, and their role in the family has become more fluid.

According to the Pew Research Center, the proportion of dual-income households more than doubled between 1960 and 2000, increasing from 25% to 60%.

Fathers are now expected to be more involved in their children's lives, including playing an active role in their education, emotional development and socialization. They are also expected to be more hands-on in the household, including sharing childcare duties, cooking, cleaning and other domestic responsibilities.

Another factor driving the changing role of fathers has been changing attitudes toward parenting. Fathers are now encouraged to be more emotionally engaged with their children and to foster a closer bond with them. Fathers are expected to be more empathetic, supportive

and nurturing and to provide a positive role model for their children.

IMPACT OF CHANGING ROLES

They typically have less discipline problems according to many studies cited by the National Institutes of Health.

Fathers who are actively involved in their children's lives are also more likely to have a closer relationship with them and to be more satisfied with their parenting role. This can lead to a more harmonious family dynamic and greater well-being for all members of the family.

Additionally, changing roles have led to a shift in gender roles and expectations. This has helped to break down traditional stereotypes about what it means to be a man or woman and has helped to create a more egalitarian society.

Fathers today are caregivers, nurturers and positive role models. As our society continues to evolve, it is essential to recognize the importance of fathers and to support them in their vital role in raising the next generation.

Father's Day Around the World

No matter where you go in the world, people celebrate the roles fathers play in the family.

The dates are different and traditions vary widely, but there are lots of ways to honor the dads and father figures in each family.

In Brazil, Father's Day is celebrated on the second Sunday in August and is known as Dia do Pais. The date was chosen in honor of St. Joachim, the father of Mary, mother of Jesus and patron saint of fathers and grandfathers. It was chosen by the journalist Roberto Marinho, who wanted to boost newspaper sales. It was first celebrated in 1953 in Rio de Janeiro. It is common to have a big family barbecue and children will spend the day writing Father's Day cards. Schools will often host special concerts or ceremonies honoring dads.

In Germany, Father's Day is called "Vatertag" and is celebrated on Ascension Day — 40 days after Easter. It is a popular tradition for groups of men to take a hike in the countryside with a wagon filled with beer and snacks. It is a national holiday that is always on a Thursday with most people also getting Friday off. Other activities include pub tours, trips to Biergartens, group bike rides or gatherings in a park with games, a grill and crates of beer. Vatertag actually began



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in the Middle Ages as a religious ceremony honoring "God, the father." In the 1700s, the day transformed into one honoring the fathers of each household with the father who had the most children in each village getting some sort of reward, usually a ham. In the 19th Century, it became more of a "boy's day out."

In Thailand, Father's Day is celebrated on the birthday of the late King Bhumibol Adulyadej, which is Dec. 5. On this day, known as Wan Por, many people wear yellow shirts and give their fathers and grandfathers the yellow canna flower, which resembles a lily and is considered a symbol of appreciation and gratitude. King Bhumibol was born in Massachusetts and his birthday has long been celebrated across the nation, especially since his death in 2016. He is considered "The Father of the Nation" and was considered an inspirational role

model father who was devoted to his family and his people.

In Japan, Father's Day is celebrated on the third Sunday in June. Flowers are an important part of the tradition as are gifts of food or drink like sake, gourmet chocolates or Japanese sweets. Children will sometimes gift their fathers with handmade beer glasses. Lunch or dinner is traditionally a dish of crab or prawns.

In Italy, Father's Day is celebrated on March 19, the feast

day of Saint Joseph, the patron saint of fathers. A popular tradition in Italy is to give fathers a small gift such as a bouquet of flowers or a pastry. Children will also create special cards and drawings for their dads complete with poetry that they write. Father's Day meals center on cakes and biscuits and fried sweet treats. Street festivals are common where people can get fried donuts, cakes and Italian cream puffs.

OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES



Famous Fathers

Great dads change the world with their commitment to their children and their community.

We tell stories about these great dads because they inspire us. Some of these stories are about real dads and others are fictional ones that show up in our books or on our screens.

HISTORIC DADS

George Washington is known as the "Father of His Country," and he was also a devoted father to his two stepchildren and two adopted children. He set an example of integrity, self-discipline and leadership.

Abraham Lincoln was a dedicated father who encouraged his children's education and creativity. He was known for his kindness and sense of humor, and he often played games and told stories with his children.

Mahatma Gandhi was a leader in the Indian independence movement and was also a loving father to his four sons, and he valued simplicity, honesty and kindness. He tried to instill his values of non-violence, truth and self-discipline in his children. He also believed in the importance of education and all his children received schooling.

Nelson Mandela was a leader in the South African anti-apartheid movement who was also a loving father who taught his children the impor-

FICTIONAL FATHERS

Atticus Finch from Harper Lee's "To Kill a Mockingbird" is one of the most famous examples of a father who was devoted to his children, taught them about tolerance and took risks to make the world a better place. His relationship with his children is a central part of the novel.

Bob Cratchit from Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" is an example of a man who works hard for his large family and teaches them joy by example despite their poverty and hardships. He stays positive even about his abusive employer who doesn't pay him enough to care for his children.

Prospero from William Shakespeare's "The Tempest" raises his daughter while in exile and uses his magical powers to provide her with a future. For her sake, he learns to forgive those who wronged him.

Based on a real person, Charles "Pa" Ingalls in the popular book series and television show "Little House on the Prairie," is portrayed as a hardworking and loving father who values his family.

George Banks from Mary Poppins (the book, the movie, the musical) serves as an example of a father who learns and grows, becoming a better father through the course of the story. He is initially portrayed as overworked, strict and distant. However, he learns to connect with his children and enjoy family life with the help of Mary Poppins. By the end, he becomes a loving and attentive father.
