Halloween Safety

This year, it's more than the usual stories about candies with surprises inside and drivers not watching out for trick-ortreaters on foot.

OBEY LOCAL ORDINANCES

Aside from the coronavirus, you do still have the usual Halloween safety reminders. Bring flashlights and lots of glow-in-the-dark gear so that drivers can see you after dark. Have an adult check the candy before the kiddos chow down. Make sure costumes are fire resistant and the makeup safe to use. Test your makeup in a small area first to make sure it doesn't cause any irritation. Kids under 12 should trick-ortreat with an adult. Make sure kids can walk easily in their © ADOBE STOCK

costume so they don't trip and fall and that they can see out of their masks. Use bug spray if you live in a rural area or in an area where it's still warm at Halloween.

A special measure for this year: Bring and frequently apply hand sanitizer.

Once in a Blue Moon

This Halloween just doesn't fall on a Saturday. This year, the skies will match your decor with a dazzling full moon. And not just any full moon —

a blue moon. Keep reading to find out more.

WHAT IS A BLUE MOON?

A blue moon is the second full moon in a month. The two full moons will be on Oct. 1 and Oct. 31. The average lunar cycle is about 29 days, meaning two full moons don't usually happen in the same month. Hence the phrase "once in a blue moon."

It doesn't have anything to do with the color, unfortunately.

"Most blue moons look pale gray and white, indistinguishable from any other moon you've ever seen," said NASA. "Squeezing a second full moon into a calendar month doesn't change the physical properties of the moon itself, so the color remains the same."

That second moon has been called a blue moon since at least 1528, when it was recorded being used in English. The first moon in October, incidentally, is called the Harvest Moon.

But on Halloween?

Yep. A full moon on Halloween happens once about every 19 years, last occurring in 2001. The next one is set for 2039. Never mind all the full moon Halloween decor. It's actually a pretty rare occurrence.

SO WHAT DOES THIS HAVE TO DO WITH HALLOWEEN?

Halloween originates from the ancient Celtic festival Samhain (rhymes with COW-in). Samhain marked the beginning of the dark half of the year, when the nights were longer and the weather colder. It also marked the end of the harvest season and the end of the Celtic year.

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Restive souls of the dead were thought to revisit their former homes seeking hospitality in the moon light, and food and drink were left out to satisfy roaming aos si, or fairies. There's also a tradition of dressing up in costume, perhaps to mimic these roaming spirits; and lighting ritual bonfires mimicked the sun, holding back the darkness of winter. Samhain was also a night of mischief, when people played pranks on one another, perhaps giving rise to today's trick or treating.
