Since the day you became engaged to be married, you have probably focused on decorations, menus, guest lists and invitations. It's easy to become wrapped up in the details.


You want your wedding to be perfect and you're committed to pulling everything together in line with your budget and timeline expectations.

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Hire the Right Photographer

Photographers depend on referrals when it comes to finding new clientele, so being flexible with rates and schedules are usually part of their business plan.

DO YOUR RESEARCH

Online tools and photographer websites have made it easy for brides and grooms to do their research. All wedding photographers are not created equal, and searching through online



rate sheets or portfolios will prove this.

Sit down with your laptop or mobile device and search for photographers in your area. Also check your local newspaper for photographers, who may be advertising special rates during the slower winter wedding season.

Make notes of what you like and dislike about the work or rates of the wedding photographers you are researching. Enter these notes, as well as photographer names and contact information, into a spreadsheet. This will help you stay organized when it's time to make your final decision.

DON'T SKIP THE CONTRACT

Even if you personally know the photographer you hire for your wedding, it's critical to enter into a written contract. Legitimate professionals will © FOTOLIA

have a standard contract for their engagements that spells out time of arrival, length of services, rights to photos and final costs.

Signing such a contract protects you in the case of not receiving full services, and can help you legally get your money back in case you put down a deposit. Make sure to get a signed copy of the contract for your records.



Wedding Technology s we increasingly turns to mobile technology for news, weather and information-gathering, the wedding industry has also jumped on board.

A simple search of the Google Play or Apple App Store reveals hundreds of mobile applications on the market designed to help you plan and execute the wedding of your dreams.

The Internet makes it easy to research gowns, vendors and wedding locations, and smartphones make it that much easier. The use of smartphones to access wedding planning websites has nearly doubled from 2011 (33 percent) to 2014 (61 percent), according to 2014 research by TheKnot.com.

Technology tools such as spreadsheets and finance trackers also help you control your budget and stay focused on the various tasks at hand. These digital gems are free in many cases, giving you a cost-effective way of organizing and maintaining important information.

ORGANIZATIONAL PURPOSES

uch can be discovered by analyzing wedding statistics, including where most people are getting married, how much money they're budgeting for their reception and how many people they are typically inviting.

These numbers may be helpful to you in planning your own wedding because you can gain an insight into how other people are approaching their own special day.

The Knot, the No. 1 multi-platform wedding resource, every year releases its Real Weddings Survey.

Last year's edition covered every thinkable statistic related to the wedding day, from the most popular colors to the average number of groomsmen picked for the ceremony.

Here are some of the highlights form The Knot's study, broken down into various categories:
