Keep in mind that every hairstyle is not flattering on everyone. Consider your face shape and features. Stay away from styles that may look harsh from certain angles.


A modern tousled up-do can be achieved with hair of many different lengths and textures and can compliment any bride's appearance.

Butterflies are cold-blooded creatures, so they go into a dormant state while being transported in the coolers. They will become activated again and ready to fly as they warm up. Complete care instructions will accompany your butterflies. Remember that butterflies must be released during daylight hours and in temperatures above 60 degrees Fahrenheit.

HOW MANY?

Many people are under the impression that more butterflies are better, but a mass of butterflies can actually be distracting and overwhelming.

Another thing to consider is that butterflies don't necessarily just fly away. They tend to flit around the area, and they will even light on guests. Typically, just a few will be enough to make a memorable statement at your wedding.

Whether your wedding is small and informal or large and ceremonial, a live butterfly release can add a beautiful, environmentally-responsible, and unique element to your wedding.

CLOTHING


Get everything organized in advance and clear your schedule the day before the wedding. Even better, clear it two days before.

Dare to be Different

CONSIDER OUTSIDE-THE-BOX WEDDING INVITATIONS

Joday's weddings have grown to become uniquely personal events whereby couples express their personalities through both traditional and eclectic means.

Weddings are no longer simply proscribed formats that must follow tradition but have evolved to become singular events in the life of the couple. VARIETY

COLOR

Adding color to an invitation is one way to make it stand out from the crowd of other invitations. Color might reflect the bride's bouquet or the bridesmaids' dresses, but it could also reflect the wedding's season.

Invitations might simply employ color to accent a border or shade a design element, but they signify originality for the invite. Colors might also reflect the wedding's theme if there is one.

PAPER

Using handmade paper will invariably add some dramatic texture to an invitation as well as color. Ivory paper threaded with gold or dotted with flower petals will make an invitation memorable and can



enhance the overall design of the wedding.

An invitation strewn with real rose petals, dried and incorporated into the paper, will certainly enhance a garden wedding, for instance.

SHAPE

In some cases, the shape of the invitation can be used to reflect personal style. An invitation in the shape of a heart needs little explanation, but one shaped as an Asian fan could signify ethnicity just as one shaped as an Eiffel Tower might signify the place where the marriage proposal took place.

Employing a unique shape is certainly not traditional, but it can reflect the personality of the couple who choose to use one.

PERSONALIZATION

Finally, although any invitation is going to include the essential information needed to announce the wedding's couple, date, venue, etc., it can also include other elements.

Consider adding a favorite love poem or quote to the

invitation or a religious verse that celebrates the couple's commitment. Even a note explaining how the couple fell in love or why they chose a particular venue could add a surprising and endearing element to the invite.

Choosing wedding invitations is simply one of the many choices a bride and groom must make as they plan their eventful day. An out-of-the-box invite can be just as classy as a traditional example, but an eclectic invite has the potential to reflect the style of the couple in a more personalized way.
