

### **Budget Check**

If you're considering taking on a remodeling project, it's important to know that home building (and thus remodeling) costs are rising. In April 2017, the National Association of Home Builders reported that according to the Producer Price Index, building material prices were up, particularly softwood lumber and engineered wood panels. NAHB reported that softwood lumber prices were up 12.9 percent since March 2016, which NAHB attributed in large part to a long-running trade dispute between the U.S. and Canada.

**SOURCE:** California Bureau of Real Estate

Quantity survey: A highly technical process in arriving at cost estimate of new construction. It involves a detailed estimate of the quantities of raw material (lumber, plaster, brick, cement, etc.,) used as well as the current price of the material and installation costs.
