Dental schools typically require transcripts, letters of recommendation, and a personal statement. The application process varies depending on the school, but it is recommended to apply to several schools to increase the chances of acceptance.

Dental schools usually take four years to complete, with the first two years focused on classroom and laboratory work, while the last two years focus on clinical work under the supervision of licensed dentists.

#### **LICENSURE**
